Middle grades students in Digital Studio plan and produce films based on an assigned theme. They are often called upon to film (and take pictures of) events and activities around the SGC. Pictures and video are shared with teachers, submitted for media release, posted to our website and/or Facebook page, or even featured on our morning announcements show, The Seahawk Morning Squawk. This project will allow 7th and 8th grade DS students to be a full-fledged media team who can be called upon to capture all the dynamic, engaging moments around the school. We have the skills: we just need the tools to make it happen!

Whenever a teacher, class, or administrator needs pictures or video taken of an event, the Seahawk Squad (with their teacher's permission) will be called into action. Each member of the squad will be a Digital Studio student and be trained to operate equipment on location; and to have appropriate demeanor while capturing moments around the school. For this purpose, squad members will need: digital cameras & memory cards; tripods to set up a "photo booth" area or shoot a video; the supplies for press passes: ID holder/lanyard packs; card stock for the printed press passes.

Digital Studio students learn how to reach an audience through pictures and video. The Seahawk Squad project will allow those who excel in DS, both in skill and demeanor, to complete service projects for the school. By participating on this team, students will make a real-world connection between media products and the events taking place in their school.

Prior to covering an event, students will gather information about the event, review teacher requests, and decide how best to reach our school audience.

Pictures and/or video will be featured on our SGC website, the morning announcements show, in a teacher's classroom - wherever needed to best reach the intended audience.

Some examples of events our squad could cover would include:

-- Third grade "The Ugly Turkey" play, which is performed several times over the course of two days for other classes, parents, and the community.

-- Spirit Week pictures

-- "Mock Trials" in which 8th grade civics students participate with local-area lawyers and a judge

Evaluation: How will you know if the objectives have been met? How will the outcomes be measured?

Pictures and video will be shared with the school and the community. Announcements will be read on the morning show and posted on the SGC site/Facebook page to let the SGC family know where to look for pictures and video. I will also email the SGC staff to touch base with them about the project: student demeanor in their classrooms and at events; frequency of visits to our media outlets; suggestions they may have to publicize other events and use other media outlets.

Innovation: Explain the innovative learning experiences in this project.

The SGC has never had a student group that could be called upon to serve in this capacity. The pictures and videos taken by this group would support yearbook, the morning announcements, media release, the website, and the Facebook page. Their coverage could also be used by administrators for presentations to parents and the community.

I believe every school could use the Seahawk Squad as a model for their own team. The pictures and video captured by these students would be visible to other schools so they can see how a team of students could support their own school in this way.

Since students would be selected from Digital Studio classes, the squad could be formed very quickly this fall. As soon as the project can move forward, students would be notified of a try-out process and be selected for the squad.
