A local children's author will present a lesson on what an author does. She will share an author's tools, and demonstrate how to write a story.

36 four-year old students will observe a concrete demonstration of how to write a book, given by a local author.

Ms. Kim Norman, author of “Puddle Pig,” “ I Know a Wee Pig” and several other fictitious books for young children, will visit our classroom. She will demonstrate the steps for writing a book, from forming the initial idea to putting the words on paper. She will share writers’ tools and introduce the children to new vocabulary.

Preschoolers do not understand what an author does. They can parrot the words “an author writes the book.” They have no idea what that really means. They need concrete examples and a visual demonstration. Our program is designed for low-income families that lack exposure to books in the home, vocabulary and concrete experiences. To meet a real author and read her books would be a unique, life-altering experience.

Lesson Plan:

We will begin the unit by reading some of Ms. Norman's books. With the author, the students will brainstorm and vote on an idea. The children will write using a variety of materials and technology to convey thoughts, ideas, and experiences.

As a class, we will write the story, using words offered by the students, and supplementary vocabulary directly from the demonstration. This will be a long-term unit. We will use the book we make together to identify initial consonants, letter sounds and sight words, as well as increase vocabulary from topic concepts. We will increase print awareness by having the students identify various text components, such as the front and back covers, title, and spaces between words in the title, and demonstrate directionality. Finally, each child will have a chance to dictate or write their own book and take it home. Each child will also receive a free copy or one of Ms. Norman's books to take home.

Each student will describe what an author does. Each student will be able to name an author's tool. They will dictate or write their own books and be able to say that they are the author.

Yes. The local author is very willing to come to schools and give presentations to all grades. I have observed one of her presentations to my class. She is willing to do assemblies, or individual classes. I am sharing my project with my team mate's class. I will photograph the student during the entire process and disseminate them to Hampton City Schools, following protocol.
