Hampton City Schools encourages students and their families to continue reading through the summer months. Many studies have shown that students need to read over the summer to sustain their reading and writing abilities. Students who read during the summer tend to start the next school year ahead and stay ahead.


Hampton City Schools highly suggests summer reading for all high school students. The reading lists, per grade level, are below. Books are identified as fiction or nonfiction and provide the *Lexile* (complexity level) of the book. Each student will need to know the level and grade of his/her first semester English course for the 2022-2023 school year in order to choose the correct titles and suggested number of books.

As HCS continues to ensure reading is enjoyable and relevant for all learners, the summer reading is diverse and inclusive. Parents and students are encouraged to examine books and reviews in advance, as some of the books contain mature language and/or content. Students may borrow a book from the public library, share with a peer, or purchase their own. Some used books are available from sites such as <https://www.thriftbooks.com/> and <https://www.betterworldbooks.com/>. Many titles are also available in electronic versions. Students can access free online versions of books through MackinVia, which can be accessed on the school's Library Media Center webpage, or through Overdrive, which is available through the [Hampton Public Library](#). You must have a Hampton Public Library card to check out an ebook through Overdrive.

Teachers will begin the year with discussions and activities related to the summer reading. Students will be asked to synthesize the readings through discussions and writing activities. In order to prepare for these activities, students are encouraged to maintain a reading log to include any of the following information: plot, setting, character information, events, details, author information, figurative language, and vocabulary. The log will help students to identify and recall critical information. Reading should be completed by September 6, 2022.
